# End of Year Expectations and Prom Reveal

## Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School: Pay Attention to Attendance

Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students access learning opportunities and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job. Families can also advocate for resources to help students learn if they cannot attend in person.

#### DID YOU KNOW?

- . Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Frequent absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other difficulty.
- · By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- By 9th grade, attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- . Missing 10%, or 2 days a month, over the course of the school year, can affect a student's academic success.

#### WHAT YOU CAN DO

#### Make school attendance a priority

- . Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day.
- · Help your teen maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and non-Covid-19 related medical appointments during the school day.
- Keep your student healthy, and if you are concerned about Covid-19, call your school for advice.
- If your teens must stay home because they are sick or in quarantine, make sure they have asked teachers for resources and materials to make up for the missed learning time in the classroom.

#### Help your teen stay engaged

- · Find out if your children feel engaged by their classes, and feel safe from bullies and other threats.
- Make sure your teens are not missing class because of challenges with behavioral issues or school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, contact the school and work with them to find a solution.
- Monitor you teen's academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors when necessary. Make sure teachers know how to contact you.
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- . Encourage your teen to join meaningful after-school activities, including sports and clubs.
- · Notice and support your students if they are showing signs of anxiety.

# End of Year Expectations and Prom Reveal

- ACADEMICS (Course Work)
  - Finish the 2023-2024 school year strong with the 4<sup>th</sup> marking period being your strongest of the year IF NOT YOUR HS career!
  - You MUST meet PA's graduation requirements or we can not legally permit you to receive your diploma (letters have gone out if in jeopardy of not graduating see your counselor ASAP if in this situation)

- A requirement for graduation shall be the completion of work and studies representing the instructional program assigned to grades nine through twelve, which are aligned to established academic standards.
- Each candidate for graduation shall:

Have earned twenty-four (24) credits; and

Have met the statewide graduation requirements, as defined by Act 158 of 2018, through one (1) of the following five (5) pathways:

#### • Keystone Proficiency Pathway

Scoring proficient or advanced on each Keystone Exam (Algebra I, Literature, and Biology).

#### • Keystone Composite Pathway

Earning a satisfactory composite score in accordance with **Applicable Law** on the Algebra I, Literature, and Biology Keystone Exams (while achieving a proficient score on at least one of the three exams and no less than a basic score on the remaining two).

#### • Alternative Assessment Pathway

Successful completion of locally established grade-based requirements for academic content areas associated with each Keystone Exam on which the student did not achieve proficiency and demonstration of one (1) of the following:

- Attainment of an **Established Score** on an approved alternate assessment (SAT, PSAT, ACT, or Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery test);
- Attainment of at least Gold Level on the ACT WorkKeys Assessment;
- Attainment of an **Established Score** on an Advanced Placement Program in an academic content area associated with each Keystone Exam on which the student did not achieve at least a proficient score;
- Successful completion of a **Concurrent Enrollment Course** in an academic content area associated with each Keystone Exam on which the student did not achieve at least a proficient score;
- Successful completion of a pre-apprenticeship program; or
- Acceptance to an **Accredited 4-Year Nonprofit Institution of Higher Education** and evidence of the ability to enroll in college-level, credit-bearing coursework

#### • Evidence Based Pathway

Successful completion of locally established grade-based requirements for academic content areas associated with each Keystone Exam on which the student did not achieve proficiency and demonstration of three (3) pieces of evidence consistent with the student's goals and career plans, including:

One (1) of the following:

- Attainment of an **Established Score** on the ACT WorkKeys assessment, a SAT subject test, or an Advanced Placement Program Exam;
- Acceptance to an Accredited Nonprofit Institution of Higher Education other than an Accredited 4-Year Nonprofit Institution of Higher Education and evidence of the ability to enroll in college-level, credit-bearing coursework;
- Attainment of an industry-recognized credential; or
- Successful completion of a Concurrent Enrollment Course or a postsecondary course; and

#### • Evidence Based Pathway (Con't.)

Two (2) additional pieces of evidence, including one (1) or more of the options listed above, or:


- Satisfactory completion of a service learning project;
- Attainment of a score of proficient or advanced on a Keystone Exam;
- A letter guaranteeing full-time employment;
- A certificate of successful completion of an internship, externship, or Cooperative Education Program; or
- Satisfactory compliance with the National Collegiate Athletic Association's core courses for college-bound student athletes with a minimum grade point average of 2.0.

#### • CTE Pathway

For CTE Concentrators, successful completion of locally established grade-based requirements for academic content areas associated with each Keystone Exam on which the student did not achieve proficiency, and completion of one (1) of the following:

Attainment of an industry-based competency certification related to the CTE Concentrator's program of study; or

Demonstration of a high likelihood of success on an **Approved Industry-Based Competency Assessment** or readiness for continued meaningful engagement in the CTE Concentrator's program of study. The determination shall be made no later than the end of grade eleven, or, for a student enrolled in a one-year program, the end of the first semester of grade twelve.

  - See Mrs. Brown in the main office if you have an obligation and how to clear your name if you do




# Wednesday, May 22 – Yearbook Ceremony

## Final Exams Wednesday, May 22 – Friday, May 31




- The most important academic activity that involves EVERYONE at this point in the school year.

#### SENIOR PROM TICKET INFORMATION

#### (IF YOU ARE NOT BRINGING SOMEONE FROM ANOTHER SCHOOL...)

- 1. Go to the "Announcement Hub" on Canvas
- 2. Find the link for "Family ID-CASH Student ONLY" and fill out the necessary information.
- Once you receive an email stating you are approved, you can go to the school store to receive your ticket code and announcement card. YOU MUST HAVE A PHOTO ID WITH YOU!
- Once you receive your code, you will be able to purchase your ticket anytime BEFORE Friday, May 24 at 11:59pm. TICKETS ARE \$100 each.

\*Note – If your date is a student at CASH – BOTH of you must be approved prior to receiving a ticket code. Once BOTH STUDENTS ARE APPROVED, one of you can come to the school store to get the ticket code and announcement card. **BOTH PHOTO IDs are NEEDED!**The ticket you purchase will be a couples ticket (\$200), good for you and your date.

Family ID will close on Wednesday, 5/22 at 11:59pm. The link to purchase tickets on Hometown will close on Friday, 5/24 at 11:59pm. DO NOT WAIT TO REGISTER AND/OR PURCHASE A TICKET.

#### (IF YOU ARE BRINGING SOMEONE FROM ANOTHER SCHOOL ... )

#### All guests must be UNDER the age of 21!!! Tickets WILL NOT be sold to anyone 21 years of age or older.

 Get a permission form for your guest from the main office or download it from the "Announcement Hub". Send it to your guest to be filled out by them, their parent/guardian and guest's school. If your guest is a graduate, they will put their college or place of work. Forms CANNOT be emailed, faxed, etc. to any staff member. The form must be physically handed in at the time you purchase you come to get your ticket code.

\*Note: All permission forms will be verified by administration fraudulent or forged permission forms will result in a loss of privilege to attend the prom!

- Find the link for "Family ID-CASH Student ONLY" and complete the necessary information.
- 4. Find the link for "Family ID-CASH GUEST" and complete the necessary information for your guest.
- Once you receive an email stating you are approved, you can go to the school store to receive your ticket code and announcement card. You will need to bring the following with you:
